

# GETTING HELP WITH FINANCIAL AID

If you wish to utilize financial aid to help finance your education at Purdue Global, you need to fill out some important forms, including your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

The FAFSA is used by the Department of Education to determine how much financial assistance a student is eligible to receive in order to attend a college or university. After the form is completed, the results are submitted electronically to each school the student intends to apply to, and a Student Aid Report (SAR) is sent to the student.

# 1 Determine Your Dependency Status

It is important to know whether the U.S. Department of Education considers you a dependent or independent student for the purpose of completing the FAFSA.

If you are considered **dependent**, you will need your and your parents' tax information from two years ago (prior-prior year) to complete your FAFSA.

If you are considered **independent**, you will only need your tax information from two years ago (prior-prior year) to complete your FAFSA.

To determine your dependency status, review the following list and check any statements that apply:

- I was born before January 1, 1995**  
(If you are applying for the 2018–2019 school year)
- I am married**  
(Answer "yes" if you are separated but not divorced)
- I will be working on a master's or doctorate program**  
(e.g., MA, MBA, MD, JD, PhD, EdD, graduate certificate)
- I am serving on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces for purposes other than training**
- I am a veteran of the U.S. Armed Forces**
- I have children and I provide more than half of their support**
- Since I turned age 13, both of my parents were deceased**
- I have dependents (other than my children or my spouse) who live with me and I provide more than half of their support**
- I was in foster care since turning age 13**
- I was a dependent or ward of the court since turning age 13**
- I am currently or I was an emancipated minor**
- I am homeless or I am at risk of being homeless**

**Important:** If you checked **NONE** of the above boxes, you are considered **dependent**. That means you will need federal tax return information for **yourself AND your parents**.

If you check **ONE OR MORE** of the boxes above, you are considered **independent**. That means you will only need **your** and **your spouse's** (if applicable) federal tax return information, **NOT your parents'**.



## 2 Obtain Your U.S. Department of Education Federal Student Aid ID Identification Number (FSA ID)

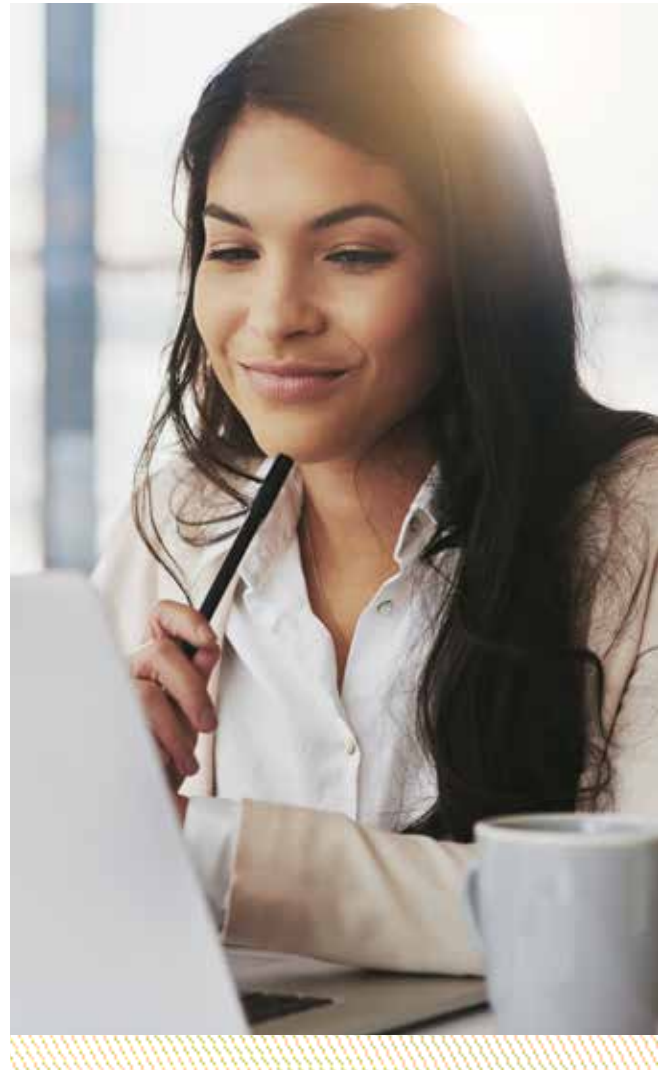
You must have an FSA ID to electronically sign your FAFSA. The FSA ID will also allow you to check your FAFSA status online and access your account information.

If you are a dependent student, your parents will also have to sign your FAFSA. That means they must have an FSA ID as well.

To apply for an FSA ID or request to have your FSA ID sent to you again, go to [fsaid.ed.gov](https://fsaid.ed.gov) where you may choose from one of the following options:

- Create an FSA ID.
- Edit my FSA ID.

**Tip:** Be sure to write down the FSA ID and keep it in a safe place because you will need it to fill out other financial aid documents. It is important that you DO NOT share your FSA ID information with anyone as your FSA ID serves as a legal signature. Keep in mind that you only have to apply for an FSA ID one time; you can use the same FSA ID each year, speeding up the time it takes for your FAFSA to be processed.



# 3 Gather Required Documents Before You Begin

You will be required to use a variety of documents to fill out the FAFSA completely and correctly. Before you begin, compile all of the documents listed below or see [“What documents do I need to fill out a FAFSA?”](#)

- Your Social Security Card (SSN - Social Security Number)
- Your alien registration or permanent residence card (if you are not a U.S. citizen)
- Your driver’s license or state I.D. (if any)
- Your previous and/or current year W-2 forms and other records of money earned
- Your (and your spouse’s, if you are married) previous and/or current year Federal Income Tax Return (IRS Form 1040, 1040A, 1040EZ, 1040TeleFile, or foreign tax return)
- Your parents’ previous and/or current year Federal Income Tax Return (IRS Form 1040, 1040A, 1040EZ, 1040TeleFile, or foreign tax return) if you are a dependent student, based on your answers in section 2
- Your previous and/or current year untaxed income records—Social Security, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, welfare, or veterans benefits records
- Your current bank statements
- Your current business and investment information, such as mortgage documentation, business and farm records, and stock, bond and other investment records

**Tip:** Take your time and do not rush through this step. Set aside an hour to make sure you have every document you need. You can save your application at any time and return to it later.



# 4 Fill Out Your FAFSA

Once you have gathered all of your documents, go to the official government [FAFSA website](#) and click on "Start A New FAFSA." Then log in with your FSA ID and select the applicable FAFSA year from the dropdown menu.

If you are starting school on or after July 1, 2018, you will need to complete the **2018–2019 FAFSA**, using your **2016 taxes**.

All continuing students are required to complete a 2018–2019 FAFSA for any term that begins after July 1, 2018.

When filling out the FAFSA you will be prompted to use the IRS data retrieval tool. We encourage you to use this tool to ensure you access your tax return information directly from the IRS.

Follow the instructions on each page of the application and enter all required information carefully. Enter all names as they appear on your and/or your parents' Social Security card.

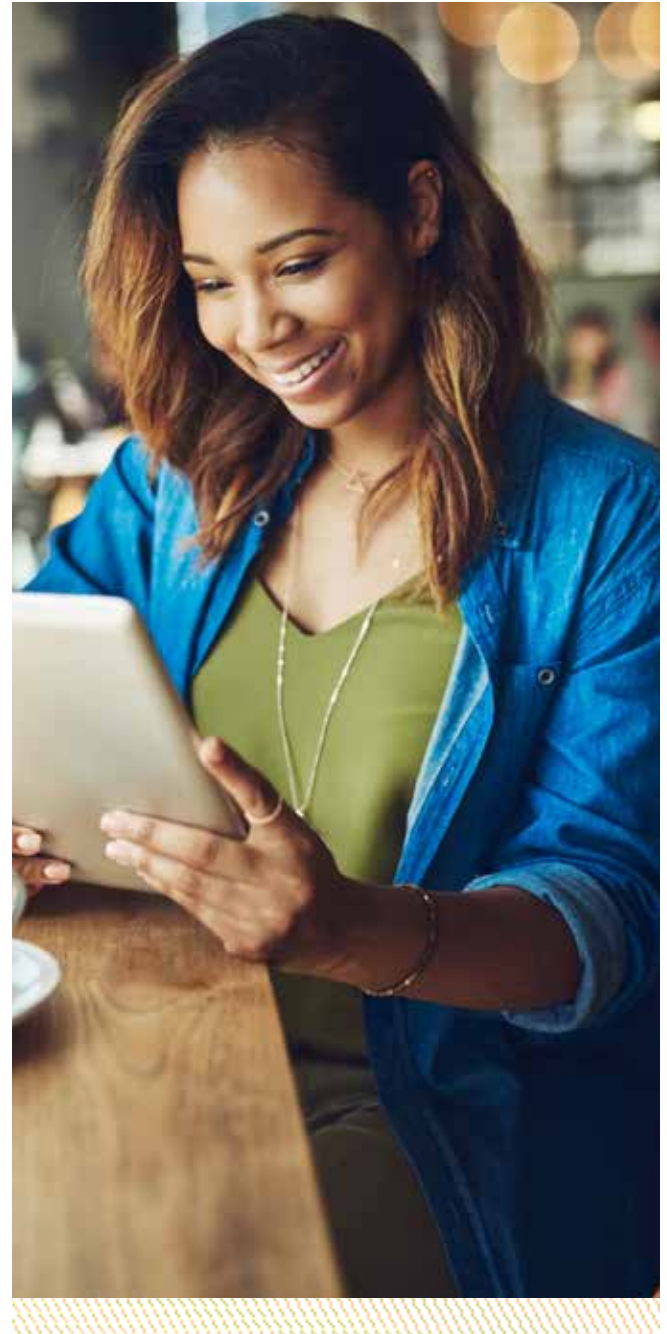
**Please note Purdue Global's school code for online is 004586 (Indianapolis, Indiana). Ground campus and learning center students see the Financial Aid Office at your school for your respective school code.**

# 5 Save a Copy of Your FAFSA Web Submission

Your FAFSA application provides a “FAFSA on the Web Submission Confirmation” page (see the screen shot below).

Be sure to retain a copy of the confirmation page for your records. You can either print, save, or send it to your email.
